- 71 Palestinians killed
- 268 wounded

OCHA: ISRAEL'S COERCIVE MEASURES CAUSING DISPLACEMENT

In a report, the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) said around 100 Palestinians were forced to leave the Ras At-Teen Bedouin community near Ramallah city last month.

The report cited unbearable living conditions as a result of Israel's "coercive measures", settler violence and demolitions of their shelters as reasons that forced Palestinian residents to leave their community.

The UN report called on the Israeli authorities to halt the policy of home demolition and land confiscation, hold settlers accountable for their violence against Palestinian residents and to prevent Israeli forces from using excessive force against them.

Estimates indicate there are about 660,000 settlers living in 145 settlements and 140 outposts in the occupied West Bank.

GAZA UNDER ATTACK

On August 5, Israel launched an attack by air on various points in the besieged Palestinian Strip. The main focus was a residential building in Gaza City. Several missiles landed with precision on three apartments in that building. The 48-hour Israeli aggression on the Gaza Strip claimed the lives of at least 48, including 15 children and 6 women. More than 300 people have been injured, not to mention the massive destruction and the losses that mounted to millions of dollars the infrastructure, buildings and farms, in the already besieged Gaza Strip.

But, what prompted Israel's military operation, absent any action from the Palestinian side in the West Bank or in Gaza? Israel lacked even its usual excuse that it was "responding" to attacks on its civilians and soldiers.

There have been so far over 615,497 confirmed cases of COVID, 591,464 recovery cases and 5,691 deaths.


MEET PROF. MUNIR NAYFEH



Professor Munir Nayfeh is a particle physicist renowned for his pioneering work in nanotechnology. Nayfeh was born in 1945, in the neighborhood of Shweikeh in Tulkarem. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the American University of Beirut in 1968, and 1970, respectively. He earned a Ph.D. in physics from Stanford University in 1974. He served as a postdoctoral fellow and research physicist at Oak Ridge National Laboratory from 1974-1977, and as a lecturer at Yale University in 1977, before joining the physics faculty at the University of Illinois in 1978.

He published over 130 papers and 10 books, and holds several patents. Nayfeh is most noted for his pioneering work in nanotechnology and in 1974 published a milestone paper with one of the 2005 Nobel Prize Laureate in Physics Theodor W. Hänsch on a precision measurement of the Rydberg Constant. Professor Nayfeh is also the founder of NanoSi Advanced Technology Inc., which commercializes nano-sized silicon particles for solar energy, electronics, solid state lighting, and biomedicine applications.

CAMERA PALAESTINA: PHOTOGRAPHY AND DISPLACED HISTORIES OF PALESTINE

Camera Palaestina is a critical Jerusalemite exploration of chronicler Wasif Jawhariyyeh (1904 1972) and his seven photography albums entitled "The Illustrated History of Palestine". Jawhariyyeh's nine hundred images narrate the rich cultural and political milieu of Ottoman and Mandate Palestine. Nassar, Sheehi, and Tamari locate this archive at the juncture between the history of photography in the Arab world and the social history of Palestine. Shedding new light on this foundational period, the authors explore not just major historical events and the development of an urban bourgeois lifestyle but a social field of vision of Palestinian life as exemplified in the Jerusalem community. Tracking the interplay between photographic images, the authors offer evidence of the unbroken field of material, historical, and collective experience from the living past to the living present of Arab Palestine.

IBRAHIMI MOSQUE HEBRON

The Ibrahim Mosque was built over the cave which contains the tombs of Ibrahim and his wife Sarah and their children, Isaac and Jacob. The Ibrahim Mosque is one of the oldest historic buildings that exist in the world in terms of its seniority and its sacredness. Its walls have witnessed important events in the history of mankind throughout more than two thousand years. Studies indicate that it was built during the reign of Herod in the last decade of B.C.

In 1994, the Israeli settler Baruch Goldstein created a massacre in the Ibrahimi mosque where dozens of Palestinians were killed inside the mosque during the early Muslim prayer. The impact of the attack was the Israeli army closed some rooms and parts of the mosque and divided it into both a mosque and a synagogue.
